



South Umpqua School District Early Entrance to Kindergarten/First Grade

Dear Parent/Guardian:

You have requested information regarding early entry to kindergarten in the South Umpqua School District. Oregon law states that, "children who have reached their fifth birthday on or before September 1st shall be admitted to kindergarten." South Umpqua School District Board policy JEBA allows the parents of a child whose birthday falls after September 1st to apply for early entrance to kindergarten if the child's cognitive, social, and physical development indicate kindergarten readiness.

The skills and maturity level of a student are determined using the following instruments: a parent questionnaire, a preschool teacher questionnaire, observation of child in a preschool setting, and Bracken Assessment.

Attached, please find information that will assist you in your request for early entry screening and testing:

- 2. The Request Process/Frequently Asked Questions for early entry consideration.
- 3. An application form for early entrance consideration.
- 4. A parent questionnaire.

Please note that the completed application should be returned to your South Umpqua School District neighborhood school no later than April 15th. Applications received after April 15th cannot be considered.

The assessment and screening process is performed by a team of education professionals. The team will review the assessment results and screening materials and a district representative will contact you after June 15th whether or not your child meets the criteria for early entrance. The team's decision is final.

Early Entrance -- Frequently Asked Questions

Is Early Entrance right for my child?

Are you considering early entrance for your child? There are many factors to consider. This flyer describes the process used in South Umpqua School District to help you determine if early entrance may be a match.

What is the age requirement for kindergarten and first grade?

In Oregon, a child must be five years old on or before September 1 of the school year they wish to enter kindergarten. A child must be six years old on or before September 1 of the school year they want to enter first grade.

Are there any exceptions?

Early entry into school will be allowed for a student whose fifth (Kindergarten) or sixth (first grade) birthday occurs between September 2nd and October 1st and who is sufficiently advanced to succeed in the educational program based on an analysis by qualified professional staff of his/her cognitive, social, physical, and language development. **First graders** transferring from a public school do not need to apply for early entrance. **First graders** transferring from a private school will be assessed for readiness in the same manner as other early entrance students.

How do I apply for early entrance?

Visit your child's neighborhood school and ask for an 'Early Entrance Request' packet. Complete the packet and the parent questionnaire then submit them to your school's office anytime between February 1 and April 15. You will be contacted by a specialist to set up an appointment for an assessment and to schedule an observation at your child's pre-school. Requests received after April 15 for any given school year cannot be considered.

What are the assessment criteria?

The Student Success Team (SST) will review the submitted parent checklist, preschool teacher checklist, Bracken assessment scores, and preschool observational data on social, physical, and language development. These factors will be considered to determine if the applicant qualifies for early entry.

What happens next?

A team from the school will meet with you to review the findings. If your child meets criteria and there is consensus that early entrance is appropriate for your child, then you may register for school. Results of the assessment and determination will be made available to parents after June 15.

Is there a cost for the assessment?

There is a \$75.00 non-refundable assessment fee. The fee may be waived for families that can demonstrate financial hardship.

Can I appeal the decision of the screening team if my child is not accepted for early entrance?

No. Every effort is being made to ensure that the screening process is fair and equitable. Decisions on kindergarten/first grade readiness will be made by a team of professionals. The team's decision is final.

Early Entrance**

A student is considered six years of age and will be admitted into a public school if his/her sixth birthday occurs on or before September 1. A student whose sixth birthday occurs after that date may be admitted to the first grade if he/she has maintained regular attendance in any grade of a public full-time school during the entire school term.

A student will be admitted to kindergarten if his/her fifth birthday occurs on or before September 1, or is a kindergarten student transferring from a public school in another district.

Early entry into school may be allowed for a student whose needs would best be met in the school program based on an analysis by qualified professional staff of his/her:

- 1. Cognitive development;
- 2. Social development;
- 3. Physical development.

The superintendent shall identify screening processes and instruments which will provide a dependable assessment of the preceding criteria.

Parents will be required to pay the cost of the special testing involved.
